- 1.* Lateromedial views of the phalanges-including coffin, pastern and fetlock joints **LM**
- 2.* Dorso-palmar views of the phalanges- including coffin, pastern and fetlock joints **DP**
- 3. Dorso-palmar projection with the toe of the foot in a foot block (dorsoproximal-palmarodistal oblique or Oxspring view). The navicular bone must be displayed in the distal half of the middle phalanx and should not overlap the joint space of the coffin joint **DPr-PaDiO**

LEFT FORE:(shoe removed)

- 4.* Lateromedial views of the phalanges-including coffin, pastern and fetlock joints **LM**
- 5.* Dorso-palmar views of the phalanges- including coffin, pastern and fetlock joints **DP**
- 6. Dorso-palmar projection with the toe of the foot in a foot block (dorsoproximal-palmarodistal oblique or Oxspring view). The navicular bone must be displayed in the distal half of the middle phalanx and should not overlap the joint space of the coffin joint **DPr-PaDiO**

- 15. Lateromedial (LM) including fetlock, pastern and coffin joints and the distal phalanx. **LM**

Notes for veterinary surgeons

Grading of Recurrent Laryngeal Neuropathy

Grade 1 – All movements, both adductory and abductory, are synchronised at rest and after exercise. Any appearance of asymmetry arises as an artifact of the position of the endoscope; the perspective distortion is cancelled when the left and right nostrils are used in turn. This being the case a “mirror” effect operates such that when the endoscopy is performed through the right nasal passage, the right arytenoid may appear less abducted and vice versa.

Grade 2 – All major movements are symmetric with a full range of adduction and abduction. Transient asynchrony flutter, or delayed or biphasic abduction may be seen, especially of the left arytenoid.

Grade 3 – Although the left arytenoid is still capable of full abduction, activity is generally reduced on the left when compared with the right, with periods of prolonged asymmetry, particularly during quiet movements. Full bilateral abduction can be stimulated transiently by partial asphyxiation using nostril occlusion, but is not sustained.

Grade 4 – The left arytenoid is no longer capable of full abduction and during adduction, compensation by the right arytenoid crossing the midline may be evident. Asymmetry is marked, but residual movements are present.

Grade 5 – True hemiplegia - active movement is completely absent on the affected side and the “slap” test does not provoke any response.

Note for Veterinary Surgeons regarding the grading of Recurrent Laryngeal Neuropathy

Grade 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 (Lane System explained)

Standard of interpretation required for –
Class 1 or Class 2 in the HSI Irish Draught Horse Studbook:

- Grade 1: with no abnormal inspiratory noise
- Grade 2: with no abnormal inspiratory noise
- Grade 1: with an abnormal inspiratory noise provided the noise is not caused by any of the unsuitable conditions

Standard of interpretation for Class 3 classification in the HSI Irish Draught Horse Studbook:

- Grade 2 with an abnormal inspiratory noise
- Grade 3
- Grade 4
- Grade 5
- Grade 1 with an abnormal inspiratory noise where there is no satisfactory explanation for the noise.
- Symptoms of soft palate paralysis

Note: Lungeing is a compulsory part of the wind examination. Where the owner or examining veterinary surgeon considers that the horse should not be lunged on welfare grounds or for any other reasons, then he is unsuitable for examination and will be classified as Class 3.

However, the veterinary surgeon appointed by the IDHS (GB) or Horse Sport Ireland, in conjunction with the inspection panel, may exercise discretion on this aspect, taking due cognisance of the results of the endoscopic examination and the performance of the stallion.

Veterinary requirements for inspection and classification of Irish Draught and ID Sport Horse stallions.

- a. We strongly recommend that owners contact the Inspection Management Team prior to embarking on the pre-inspection vetting to ensure that you understand what is required for your stallion:

- b. **ALL applicants** are required to have this pre-inspection veterinary screening examination form completed in full by a veterinary surgeon, in respect of the stallion for which they are applying for classification. Please note that for purebred Irish Draught stallions, this includes X-raying, as per the specification on page 2 above.
- c. **Irish Draught stallions** coming forward for re-inspection which have satisfactory x-rays from the first inspection do not need to have the x-rays repeated. However, pre-inspection vetting and endoscopy examinations must be repeated. They also have to be re-vetted on the day, as for first-time applicants.
- d. **Sport Horse stallions coming forward for inspection in Great Britain do not have to have x-rays at present.** If the owner chooses to have x-rays done, the same rules apply as for Irish Draught stallions.
- e. **Stallions** (apart from those which have been fully vetted by an HSI-approved practice in Ireland, unless they are obviously unsound on the day) will undergo a full five-stage pre-purchase veterinary examination at the inspection centre by a veterinary surgeon appointed by the IDHS (GB) veterinary advisor.
- f. All stallions will be measured at the inspection. These measurements shall be regarded as official measurements for the purpose of stallion classification in the Irish Draught Horse Studbook or IDHS GB Sport Horse Register. In instances where the measurements of a stallion are disputed, the owner shall have the option to appeal the measurements at a University Veterinary Hospital, at his/her own expense.
- g. In cases where the pre-inspection veterinary screening examination form indicates that the stallion **does not** meet the veterinary requirements for Class 1 or Class 2 in the Irish Draught Horse Studbook or Grade 1 or Grade 2 in the Sport Horse Register, the applicant may, following consultation with the IDHS (GB), have the stallion (subject to eligible pedigree) classified as Class 3 in the Irish Draught Horse Studbook or Grade 3 in the Sport Horse Register without the stallion participating in the inspection.
- h. Appropriate samples should be taken by the pre-inspection vet and sent for analysis for Equine Viral Arteritis (EVA), Equine Infectious Anaemia (EIA) and Contagious Equine Metritis (CEM). Certification of negative results should be returned to the IDHS (GB) with this application. There is also a requirement to have a one-off genetic test (hair sample) for Warmblood Fragile Foal Syndrome.
- i. Blood samples may be taken on the day of inspection and may be subject to screening for substances listed on the FEI 'Equine Prohibited Substances List' (see www.feicleansport.org).

2. X-rays

The Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland: Irish Draught stallions having their pre-inspection vetting in Ireland, but attending the inspection venue in Great Britain, are required to meet the veterinary requirements specified by Horse Sport Ireland (details are available from HSI's website) and this includes x-rays.

Stallions from Ireland have **two options** for veterinary examinations, just as they do if coming forward for selection in Ireland. The veterinary profession is regulated differently in Great Britain, where we are not allowed to nominate specific veterinary practices to carry out the full veterinary examination in advance. The pre-inspection vetting, X-rays and health tests are carried out by **any veterinary practice which normally treats equines**.

Submitting the report form and X-rays: Please would veterinary surgeons kindly email the radiographs as JPEG files to the Inspection Management Team at inspections@idhsqb.org.uk **not later than 15 February 2025**.

The closing date for all inspection applications, radiographs (if applicable), pre-inspection veterinary forms, health certificates and fees is 15 February 2025. The horse will not be allowed to come forward for inspection if any element of the application is missing.

RADIOGRAPHS MUST BE LABELLED WITH THE STALLION'S REGISTERED NAME, REGISTRATION NUMBER, DATE OF X-RAY, AND MUST IDENTIFY RIGHT OR LEFT LIMB. PHALANGES MUST BE LABELLED FORE OR HIND. THE PROJECTIONS/VIEWS MUST BE ACCURATE. THE DEFINITIONS OF BONES, JOINTS AND SOFT TISSUE OUTLINES SHOULD BE CLEARLY VISIBLE. PLEASE DO NOT X-RAY COLTS WHILE THEY ARE STILL TWO YEARS OLD – WAIT UNTIL AFTER 1 JANUARY IN THEIR THIRD YEAR.

X-rays will be subject to independent scrutiny by the IDHS (GB) Veterinary Panel prior to the inspection. In cases where the quality of the radiographs is deemed by the Panel to be unsatisfactory, the Inspection Management Team will inform the owner and a new set of radiographs will be required.

3. Appeals

3.1 Veterinary examination:

For animals which fail the clinical veterinary examination there is provision for an appeal to be made. The conditions of the appeal procedure are as follows:

- The IDHS (GB) will notify the owner of the stallion of the reason why the stallion failed the clinical veterinary examination.
- The owner of the stallion may, within 28 days, apply to the IDHS (GB) to have a clinical veterinary re-examination carried out by a recognised specialist acceptable to the IDHS GB. The re-examination will only be carried out in respect of the condition for which the stallion was failed at the initial inspection.
- The stallion owner must inform the IDHS GB of the intended date of the examination, in advance.
- The full cost of the re-examination must be borne by the owner of the stallion.
- The decision of the recognised specialist shall be final.

3.2 X-rays: In relation to stallions that do not meet the standards on inspection of the radiographs by the IDHS (GB) Veterinary Panel, there is provision for an appeal to be made. The conditions of the appeal procedure are as follows:

- The IDHS (GB) will notify the owner of the reasons for the standard not being met.
- The owner of the stallion may, within 28 days, appeal to the IDHS (GB). The appeal may involve the examination of the original X-rays by the veterinary panel, or if deemed necessary, will require the stallion to be X-rayed by a recognised specialist in equine orthopaedics.
- The full cost of the re-examination will be borne by the owner of the stallion.
- The x-rays will be evaluated by a veterinary appeals panel, whose decision shall be final.

All Irish Draught stallions and colts are required to have an X-ray examination of their stallion carried out by an appropriate veterinary practice. Reading the x-rays is included in the inspection fee of £600.

For Sport Horse stallions, x-rays are optional but all other elements of the pre inspection veterinary examination are compulsory.

Sport Horse owners who choose to have x-rays done must ensure that these are done to the specifications above, and pay the additional fee of £150 for having the panel read the x-rays. The inspection fee in this instance would be £450 plus £150 = £600.

Sport Horse stallion owners whose stallions have satisfactory x-rays can state this on publicity material if the stallion goes on to stand at public stud. This will also be publicised in the Society's publications.

In cases where the quality of the radiographs is deemed to be unsatisfactory, they will be returned and a new set of radiographs will be required. We respectfully recommend that x-rays are checked within the practice concerned before submission.
