



## Irish Draught Stallion Inspections: guidance notes 2025

Wednesday 23 April 2025 at Warwickshire College, Moreton Morrell, Warwick CV35 9BP

**Closing date: 15 February 2025**

This document provides guidance to help owners submit an application for the inspection of an Irish Draught colt or stallion aged three years old and over for grading under the Irish Horse Register classification system.

Inspections of Irish Draught horse stallions, mares and Sport Horse mares which are eligible for Supplementary Grade Up are run along the same principles and guidelines as the parent studbook holder, currently Horse Sport Ireland.

### What happens when the application is received?

Your application form will be acknowledged by personal email. If you pay online, there is an automated acknowledgement. The Inspection Management Team will then keep in touch with email updates. We may need to ring you to check that you have carried out the basic passport –related tasks needed before your stallion's inspection.

**If you don't have access to email, please ensure that you provide our team with an email address we can use.**

### **We do not post inspection information by surface mail.**

Your stallion's x-rays will be sent to our radiograph panel with basic information about him (owner, stallion age, name, breed). The panel of three eminent radiograph specialists will read the x-rays and report back to the inspection administration team.

We will contact you by email when the outcome of your stallion's x-rays is known. If there is an issue with the x-rays, we will phone you to explain the situation with you.

### **Travelling to Great Britain from Ireland for inspection**

We welcome stallions from Ireland for inspection in Great Britain. Our inspection rules are the same in principle, with small differences in detail due to the situation regarding veterinary regulation in our two countries (please see below). Please will owners bear in mind the following:

- Due to subsidies, the inspection fee in Ireland has been, at least up until 2024, considerably cheaper.
- Any owners in Great Britain who wish to pursue the option to travel to Ireland are advised to check out the regulations and costs associated with importing and re-exporting a horse into and back from an EU country. The rules are changing regularly and the inspection management team does not have any expertise in this specialised area. Please see the GOV.UK and the DAFM websites for details.
- If you are bringing an Irish stallion into Great Britain for inspection and plan to take him back to Ireland the same day or the following day, you will need to identify a veterinary surgeon who can complete the export paperwork required for his return journey. It is unlikely to be possible to fit this into our vet's busy timetable on the day, and it is not covered by your inspection fee.
- Applicants coming from Ireland have two options with regard to veterinary procedures, but we can only offer one option in Great Britain. We are not permitted to have Designated Centres in Great Britain.

### **Stables can be booked through the Inspection Management Team**

Please email us to say when you intend to arrive and when you intend to leave.

Owners may bring shavings with them (not straw) and/or purchase extra shavings on site. All feed and hay must be supplied by the stallion owner. Stallion stable doors have anti-weave grilles. These must be used for health and safety reasons.

We charge a £20 deposit on booking the stable. This will be repaid by BACS or cheque after the inspection, provided the stable is left clean and tidy with any bedding left up around the stable sides. Please cooperate with this. Our volunteers do not have time to muck out stables, so please cooperate with this rule.

Payment for each stable must be made in advance using our online payment system plus the £20 'clean stable' deposit.

### **Preparation for your stallion's inspection**

Some stallions are prepared at home, and others are sent to professional producers for preparation. Please allow adequate time for your stallion's preparation.

About a month before the inspection, you will receive a timetable with your vetting and inspection times. Please let us know as soon as possible if there is a problem with your allocated times. Stallions are inspected in the morning, mares in the afternoon. The precise times depend on numbers and genders of animals coming forward.

### **Check In**

All owners must report to one of the inspection administrators upon arrival at the centre in order to check in. You must check in not later than one hour before your scheduled veterinary time.

At this time, all owners must present the stallion's passport and sign the disclaimer forms, retaining one copy. We retain the passport for the duration of the inspection. The passport is stamped with the inspection grade and returned to you before you leave.

Please note stallions that have not been checked in **cannot** be presented at the first stage of the vetting and inspection.

### **Photographs**

- The inspection administrator will take photographs of your stallion to form part of the inspection record.
- **1<sup>st</sup> Class Images** will be available to take professional photographs, which you can purchase direct from them. The steward will ask you to attend for your stallion to be photographed at the appropriate time.
- The stallion must be stood up correctly with all four limbs fully engaged (i.e. not resting a foot) and should show the horse to his best advantage. The stance should be open, so that three or four legs can be seen from the side.
- If you wish to use photographs for publicity purposes, please ask the photographer's permission and always credit each use.

### **Familiarisation with the Jumping Pen**

The jumping pen will be available to stallion owners to walk down (poles on the ground) between the hours of 17.00 – 18.00 on the evening before the stallion inspections. Stallions will be allowed to receive a five-minute familiarisation period in the lane. Jumping is not permitted during the familiarisation period.

Only one handler and stallion may enter the indoor school at a time. This will be strictly monitored and will be available on a first come, first served basis. This facility must be pre-booked with the administration team on [inspections@idhsgb.org.uk](mailto:inspections@idhsgb.org.uk)

If you choose not to come the night before the inspection, there will be a second opportunity to access the lane between 07.30 and 08.00 on the day of the inspection under the same terms as above. Again, must be pre booked and an official must be present at the time to ensure safe passage of all animals.

Please note that we use plastic building site tape to mark out the jumping lane, so it would be a good idea to get your stallion used to this before the inspection. We do not use Heras panels.

### **Health and Safety**

This event is supported by a full and detailed risk assessment. Health and safety is the responsibility of all of us. Anything to do with horses is inherently hazardous and we cannot eliminate all risk. If you see any particularly risky situations developing, please report them to one of the administrators, stewards or the stable manager.

If anyone needs first aid, please report to any official on site on the day. For any significant medical incident, it is our policy to request external medical support.

### **Stallion handlers and riders**

Stallion handlers and riders must be aged 18 years or over.

We do not discriminate against anyone on the grounds of disability or temporary incapacity. However, our event risk assessment states that **stallion handlers must be physically fit and strong enough to handle the stallion safely in public**. This is for the protection of the handler, the inspection officials and all the horses and people present at the inspection centre.

Stallion owners and handlers must have all the necessary equipment (i.e. tack, lunge whips, lunge lines, etc.) at the inspection. Handlers are required to wear clothing appropriate to showing. Comfortable footwear must be worn in order to present the animal correctly.

In cases where an owner has more than one horse on the premises, sufficient handlers must be on site to cater for each animal. If there are very few stallion entries it may not be logistically possible to separate stallion vetting times by more than one horse. If you have two stallions forward, we will do our best with the timetabling, but you may need an additional person to hold one animal for the vet while the other is being inspected.

For any ridden elements of these inspections, riders must wear 'appropriate competition riding attire'. This includes protective headgear which complies with current British Showjumping or British Eventing standards. This is compulsory for riders, whether jumping under saddle or warming up. Protective headgear is strongly encouraged for those handling stallions on the ground.

### **Babies and children under 16 years**

**Please note that babies and children** under 16 years are not allowed in the stable area under any circumstances. This is for child safeguarding/health and safety reasons. If you are bringing a young child to the inspection, please also bring an adult who can help you take care of them if you need to be involved with the stallion.

Baby buggies are not permitted in the stables or trot-up areas.

**There is no smoking on site** (including vapes).

Dogs must be kept on a short lead at all times.

## **Mares**

Please be aware that there are mare inspections at the same venue later on the same day. This is necessary in order to make up numbers and keep our inspections viable for all. There are also mares on site for other purposes outside our control, e.g. students' horses and liveries.

The mares will be inspected after the stallions and will be stabled separately. There are clear rules regarding movement around the site and a one-way system is in operation at all times, to avoid stallions coming into contact with other horses.

## **Inspection results**

The provisional results of the inspection in terms of the classification awarded will be announced publicly on the day along with a brief synopsis explaining the inspection panel's decision. The stallion owner and handler will be informed in the arena shortly before the public announcement.

British-bred Class 1 stallions will receive a BLS Award sash kindly donated by Pam Symonds in memory of her late husband, Bernard Leckie Symonds.

Irish-bred Class 1 stallions receive a rosette awarded by Horse Sport Ireland.

We ask our inspectors NOT to announce the upper beam scores immediately after the inspection. At that stage the inspection paperwork has not been double-checked by the Inspection Management Team.

For this reason, administrators do not show owners and producers the linear profile. Owners will receive a full typed report after the inspection results have been verified (see below).

## **After the inspection**

The Inspection Manager checks the stallion's paperwork to ensure that it is complete and complies with the inspection rules laid down by our parent body.

Your stallion's passport will be stamped and signed by a trustee member of the inspection management team (provided that the inspection is complete). You can have your passport back as soon as this has been done. If you are not in the immediate vicinity of the administration table, it will be placed in the stallion's file to await your return.

Inspection files are confidential and must not be accessed by the public. Please ask a steward for the passport for you before you leave, do not look for it yourself. **It is the owner or handler's responsibility** to ensure that they do not travel without the passport.

The Inspection Management Team prepares bar charts and reports on all the animals forward for inspection. This can take two to four weeks to complete, depending on numbers forward. These are emailed to the owner.

The inspection report includes a bar chart, the veterinary report and the inspection team's comments. Owners can use the bar chart and comments to inform their future breeding decisions.

If there is anything you do not understand about the inspection report and linear profile, please contact the inspection management team leader (currently Heather Chaplin, 01823 601625) to explain it to you.

### **Publicity on the web site**

Owners of newly-inspected stallions must inform the inspection management team whether or not they intend to stand their stallion at stud, so that he can be listed in the Yearbook.

The 2025 Yearbook deadline is 15 November.

**All inspected Irish Draught stallions standing at public stud** in Great Britain will be listed in the IDHS (GB) Yearbook stallion listings and on the Stallions at Stud page on the website, unless their owners ask us not to publicise them, or if they have been gelded.

If you wish your stallion to be publicised with a photograph on our website, a modified version of his inspection report will be made available as a download on our website.

Please note that stallion owners sign a statement on their application forms to agree that this information will be made public if they choose to stand their stallion at stud.

We send out inspection results annually to Horse Sport Ireland, as our parent body. They may choose to publish stallion inspection outcomes for Great Britain in their publications.

### **Owners and producers: accommodation**

### **Refreshments**

The arrangements for refreshments at Moreton Morrell (if any) have yet to be confirmed. Members of the public and stallion owners/connections are advised to bring food and drink with them.

### **Use of public photos and video taken at the inspections**

The IDHS (GB) has authorised 1<sup>st</sup> Class Images to photograph horses. In the interests of confidentiality, owners are asked not to video or audio-record in other people's horses from any location other than the public gallery or the cordoned off area in front of the covered arena. Recording veterinary and inspection officials' deliberations is strictly prohibited.

### **The public gallery**

There is a good public gallery at Moreton Morrell with plenty of seating and a clear view of the end of the arena.

Visitors and spectators are respectfully requested not to lean over the barrier or enter the surfaced part of the arena without invitation when horses are loose. Owners who are watching their horses from the gallery will be called in to receive feedback when the inspectors have concluded their assessment of the horse.

## APPENDIX 1: ARENA AND JUMPING LANE

**Note:** Horses are permitted to wear front tendon boots for the free gait assessment or the free athleticism/jumping assessment. If, in the opinion of the panel, the movement of the horse is affected in any way, the panel reserve the right to request the removal of the front boots.

The use of boots/bandages on the hind legs is not permitted.

Please ensure that you prepare your horse according to the jumping lane dimensions in this document.

The size of the indoor arena at Moreton Morrell is 60m x 23m. The inspectors and administrator will be in the arena, as will the arena team comprising five or six people.

Each stallion or mare (athleticism assessment is voluntary for mares) will be required to jump through the jumping lane. The jumping lane consists of three fences and a placing pole in front of the first fence.

The selection panel may use their discretion as to the number of attempts they wish to assess each horse over the obstacles and the height of the fences. The maximum height of the fences for 3-year-old Irish Draughts will be 1.00 metre.

If in the opinion of the selection panel a horse is jumping in an unnatural manner, the selection panel reserves the right to award zero points for their assessment of the horse's athleticism/jumping ability.

The panel reserves the right to terminate the athleticism assessment on welfare grounds if the horse is insufficiently prepared for the task.

**A diagram of the lane is below.** This is not to scale. The heights of the jumps are as in the table below, and horses jump anticlockwise.

Coloured jump poles are used. The sides of the lane will be jump stands, poles and plastic tape.

Fences are placed as follows: fence A is 6m from the end wall and 3m from the centre of the placing pole; fence B is 6.8m from (A) and fence C is 7.3m from fence B.

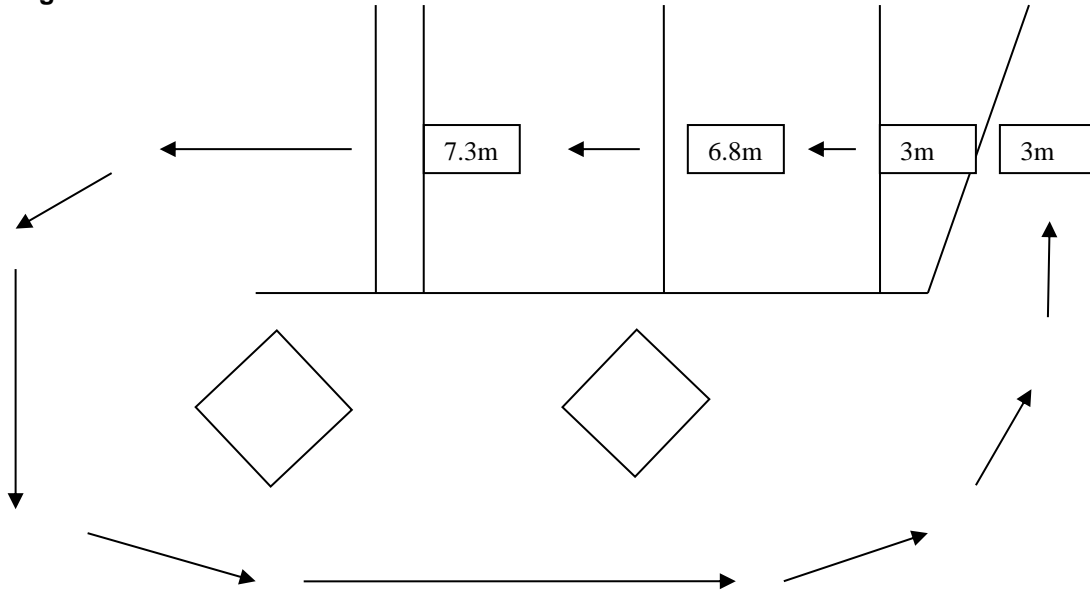
The owner or handler stands in the left hand diamond and the inspection team in the right hand diamond on the diagram below.

### **Athleticism Assessment under Saddle**

The owners of stallions and mares that are four years or older that have chosen to do this element under saddle on their application form will have their horse's athleticism assessed by jumping over a course of fences.

There may be an additional charge made to cover the cost of hiring show jumps for Irish Draught stallions and mares whose owners wish to demonstrate athleticism over a course.

**Appendix 2: The Breed Objective and Description****Breeding Objective**

The breeding objective of the Irish Draught studbook is to breed sound Irish Draught horses with correct conformation, type, movement and action, calm and willing temperaments and sufficient athleticism that conforms to the Irish Draught breed standard. These animals will serve one or more of the following three functions by:

- Participating in preservation and ongoing breed improvement programmes;
- Performing as pleasure, leisure or performance horses;
- Contributing to cross breeding programmes with other breeds.

**Breed Summary Description**

The Irish Draught Horse is a versatile, powerful and athletic animal with substance and quality. It has a pleasant head, good bone and a short shin, good spring of rib, strong loins and hindquarters and an active powerful stride. Known for its good temperament, docility and willing nature, it has a robust constitution and is inherently sound. The

Irish Draught Horse is a foundation breed that, when crossed with other breeds, will produce all types of leisure and performance horses.

### **Type of horse: detailed description**

**Height:** Ideally Irish Draughts should stand between 158cms (15.2hh) and a maximum of 170cms (16.3hh) at maturity.

**Bone:** Approximately 23cms (9 inches) of strong, clean, flat bone.

**Head:** Should be pleasant, not coarse or hatchet like, with plenty of room between the jaw bones. Wide forehead and kind eyes, set well apart, and with large quality ears.

**Neck:** Good length of rein with head well set on, neck should be correctly muscled and well shaped.

**Front legs:** Long muscular forearms, short cannon bones with plenty of strong clean, flat bone, not back at the knee or tied in below the knee. Pasterns should be in proportion with good hoof pastern axis. Hooves should be of equal size, hard and sound with plenty of room at the heel. They should not be boxy, over large or flat.

**Shoulders:** A sloping shoulder neither loaded, nor too heavy, nor too short, with well-defined withers, well set back.

**Body, back and hindquarters:** Deep girth with a good spring of rib, strong back, loins and quarters. The croup and buttocks should be long and gently sloping. Hips should not be too wide.

**Hind legs:** Strong gaskins, well shaped clean hocks set into short shins. Should not be cow-hocked or wide apart at the hocks.

**Action:** Should be straight and free, not heavy or ponderous.

**Movement:** Should be active and strong, with sufficient athleticism showing good flexion of joints and freedom of the shoulders.

**Colour:** Any strong whole colour including bay, grey, chestnut, black, brown and dun. Excessive white markings are not desirable.
